# NAVIGATING PROVINCIAL AND FEDERAL SINGLE-USE PLASTIC REGULATIONS



Canada's federal, provincial, and municipal governments have implemented prohibitions on single-use plastics that will impact your businesses.

ABLE BC recognizes that navigating these regulations can be confusing. To simplify and clarify your obligations, we've put together this comprehensive guide, highlighting both federal and provincial regulations. While there is overlap in the content of these regulations, it's crucial to consider both for a clear understanding.

In response to feedback from British Columbians, the provincial regulations are shifting to a phased implementation. While plastic items are prohibited as of December 20, 2023, some additional requirements will take effect July 15, 2024.

#### **FEDERAL REGULATIONS**

On June 22, 2022, the Government of Canada introduced the <u>Single-use Plastics Prohibition Regulations</u>. To prevent plastic pollution, the Regulations prohibit the manufacture, import, and sale of six categories of single-use plastics.

Coming into effect December 2023, the import and sale (including providing for free) of the following are banned:

### SINGLE-USE PLASTIC ITEMS PROHIBITED BY THE REGULATIONS

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#### **PROVINCIAL REGULATIONS**

The provincial Single-Use and Plastic Waste Prevention Regulation was introduced on July 14, 2023, and comes into effect on December 20, 2023. Additional requirements, such as minimum fees on reusable and paper shopping bags, will come into effect July 15, 2024. PVC film wrap will be prohibited on July 1, 2028.



The province has identified four regulated categories:

- Shopping Bags
- Disposable Food Service Accessories
- Food Service Ware
- Oxo-degradable Plastics (plastics with additives designed to break down into microplastics)

The City of Vancouver has compiled some suggested alternatives for common single use plastic products.

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### WHAT CHANGES FOR ME?

Under the new provincial regulations, businesses are now required to:

#### **SHOPPING BAGS:**

- Stop using single-use plastic, compostable, and biodegradable plastic shopping bags. Only paper shopping bags or reusable bags may be provided.
- As of July 15, 2024, charge a minimum fee of \$0.25 for paper shopping bags and \$2.00 for new reusable shopping bags.
- Offer customers the option to use their own bag (e.g. asking, displaying a sign, or via a check box online).
   Customers can choose to not use a bag.
- Let the customer know how much it will cost prior to selling a bag.

#### **FOOD SERVICE WARE:**

 Stop selling or distributing single-use food service ware made completely or partly from Class B materials (i.e. biodegradable plastics, polystyrene foam, PVC or PVDC). This includes selling or distributing food or drinks packaged in single-use food service ware.

### **DISPOSABLE FOOD SERVICE ACCESSORIES:**

- Stop providing single-use utensils made completely or partly from plastic, including compostable or biodegradable plastic.
- Stop providing pre-bundled single-use food service accessories (e.g. a knife, fork, spoon, and napkin packaged together).
- Only provide single-use utensils made from alternatives (e.g. wood, bamboo) and other single use food service accessories by-request or via a selfserve station.

#### **OXO-DEGRADABLE PLASTICS:**

 Stop selling or distributing any packaging, or single-use product made partly or completely from oxo-degradable plastics. PVC film wrap will be prohibited on July 1, 2028.



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#### **TIMELINES**

In July 2021, the BC government gave municipalities the authority to regulate four specific single-use items: checkout bags, straws, utensils, and polystyrene foam containers. Many municipalities already have bylaws in effect from as far back as 2020.

The provincial and federal timelines are aligned to make the transition easier.

As of December 20, 2023, prohibited plastic products (except plastic ring carriers) are banned. Plastic ring carriers will be banned on June 20, 2024.
